Hi my name is Landon Yamaoka and I would like to introduce myself. I would like to thank all of you for the opportunity to assist part-time at your temple! I graduated from the University of Arizona in Tucson with a bachelor's degree in Anthropology with a focus in cultural studies, and a minor in Sociology. I have learning disabilities, and the University of Arizona had the best program in the nation for people with learning differences. In addition, I took cultural studies as a replacement for my language requirements. I used East Asian studies for this, and in a Japanese religious studies class, I was introduced to the doctrine of Jodo Shinshu.

Never hearing this growing up in temple, I started my personal journey back to Jodo Shinshu by first reading my grandfather's books on his personal bookshelf, eventually leading me back to Palo Alto Buddhist Temple after college. (I had never planned to return to Sunday services after I finished Jr YBA, but I did enjoy helping at Obon every Summer).

After college I took a job at a drug recovery program taking incarcerated youth out of Juvenile Hall. I started as an educational counselor and was later asked to transfer to the living skills and drug recovery side at group home sites. My thesis for the Institute of Buddhist Studies was looking at the 12-Step Program and comparing it to other Buddhist Drug recovery models. My conclusion was that there are aspects of Jodo Shinshu teachings that can be used for a potential Shin Recovery model.

I then worked in San Francisco Japan Town for a youth organization. I ran prevention services for middle school and high school youth and received training in mental health and case management. I also worked with high schoolers in a leadership development program, and in the summer, I helped to run a camp for middle school youth.

My last job was teaching adults with developmental disabilities living and work skills, provide job coaching, and being a case manager writing reports for state social workers. Through these jobs I would at times use Buddhist ideologies, not in an effort to convert people, but to help to show a different perspective when they needed more guidance. This ultimately led me to want to learn more about Jodo Shinshu. I took the Jodo Shinshu correspondence course, then applied to IBS, where I did the dual track of Shin studies and chaplaincy.

I am looking forward to working with all of you and hope that I am able to provide some assistance where help may be needed.

In the October, 2023 Golden Chain, there was an article regarding the use of *ihai*, which are wooden tablets with the Dharma Name engraved. I was asked to clarify this matter with our sangha. My intention was that families might be inclined to have the tablet be more visible when placed in the niche or family altar. However, upon further inquiry, in Japan it is commonly understood in many Buddhist schools other than Jodo Shinshu that the soul of the deceased is contained within the *ihai*. I had no intention of portraying this point, as this runs contrary to the Jodo Shinshu understanding that all beings are born in the Pure Land upon one's passing. Any possible misunderstanding caused by this


