Stone of Tears

The Bay District organized a group to visit Japan for the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the founding of the Jodo Shinshu tradition. The group also went to the island of Kyushu, visiting different cities such as Hakata, Ibusuki, Chiran, and Kagoshima. One of the sites I would like to introduce is Kagoshima Betsuin which is located right in the heart of Kagoshima city.



The magnificent building looks amazing from the outside, and the scale of the *hondo* was beyond compare. Rev. Adams of the San Mateo Buddhist Church led the sutra chanting, and it was nice

to feel a sense of familiarity in a such a grand temple far, far away from our home in California. After the sutra chanting, a representative of the Betsuin by the name of Rev. Chiba, gave us a lecture explaining the history of the temple but also, of the *kakure nembutsu*, which literally means "hiding nembutsu."

Long ago, the region of Kagoshima, known as Satsuma at the time, outlawed the Jodo Shinshu religion and the practice of it, because they saw it as having too much influence over its people. Those who were in power were worried that these devout followers would not follow their local lords and the laws of the domain, so they forcibly banished this religion. However, the Nembutsu followers devoted themselves to continue to hear the teachings of the Buddha Dharma, so they hid in various locations and carried out their services in secret locations tucked away from prying eyes. These followers sometimes went to the extent of not telling their children where they would gather and worship for fear that the young children might inadvertently give away the location of their secret meeting areas.

Stone of Tears

Kagoshima Betsuin

Inevitably, some individuals were caught and forced to confess their faith in the Jodo Shinshu tradition. They were tortured and some were killed in public for practicing their religion. In one such case of torture, the individual would be forced to sit in *seiza*, or on one's knees, on top of triangular shaped poles. There, a heavy boulder would be placed on the person's lap, forcing the shins of the person's legs to dig into the angular poles. Needless to say, the pain would have been excruciating. These individuals would sit in this position for hours on end and their tears would flow from their faces and drop down to the heavy rock. This rock later became known as *namidaishi*, or "stone of tears." That stone still exists and it is on display on the grounds of the Betsuin. The stone might be difficult to see, but it rests on a pillar holding it up prominently for better visibility.

When we see this rock, it is a symbol of the struggle that these individuals had to endure so that the next generation would be able to receive the Buddha Dharma. It is because of their perseverance through this horrendous ordeal that we are able to hear and receive the message of Amida Buddha's Boundless Wisdom and Compassion today. Let us look upon the rock not just as the symbol of the struggle that these individuals had to endure, but also as the symbol of the undying and unbreakable devotion they had to the spread of the Nembutsu teaching. Gassho.





淚石

今年の5月6日から19日にかけて、桑湾教区の38名が日本に行き、本願寺へ参拝させていただきました。この度は、親鸞聖人のご誕生の850周年、そして浄土真宗の教えが始まってから「立教開宗」の800周年記念となります。また同時に国際仏教婦人会大会が京都で行われました。法要後、団体旅行として九州の方へ回ってきました。博博多、指宿、知覧、そして鹿児島といった九州の最南の地方を見学してきました。今回は、その中の鹿児島別院を紹介させていただきます。

鹿児島市内の中心に立派な建物がそびえていますが、それが鹿児島別院です。外から見るだけで圧倒されました。そして、本堂の方へ進んでいきますと、なんと驚くほど立派なお内陣が光り輝いておりました。本堂に入り、サンマテオ仏教会の開教使アダムズ先生のリードで皆でお勤めをさせていただきました。私にとって、初めての鹿児島別院でしたが、お経の声を聴くと、突然違和感が解けたような感じがしました。とても和やかな心温まるひと時でした。お勤めの後、別院の千葉先生から別院の紹介と「隠れ念仏」の話を聞かせていただきました。

ご承知だと思いますが、鹿児島の地域は、昔「薩摩」と呼んでいました。この地は長年島津氏の領内でしたが、長年浄土真宗の教えが禁制されました。ここの真宗の信者は、とても熱心な方が多く、権力者の言うことを聞かないという恐れで浄土真宗を抑制したのです。しかし、多く信者の方は、この教えを生きる拠り所としていたため、密かに阿弥陀如来様を拝み続けたそうです。地下まで掘って造った洞窟など、周りの目にバレないように、秘密の場所でお勤めをしていたそうです。また、信者たちは、このような場所が見つからないように、子供にも内緒にしたという説明も聞きました。

しかし、浄土真宗の信者だったことが分かった時、この人たちはひどい目にあわされたそうです。一つの例は、「涙石」という話です。三角形になった棒のいくつかが並べられた板の上に信者たちが正座させられて、その人たちの膝の上に大きな石を載せて、何時間も座らせたそうです。とんでもない痛さによってその人が涙を石の上にこぼしたそうです。これを「涙石」といったのです。そしてその涙石が実は残っていて、それが別院の境内にあります。これを見ただけで、その激しい痛みがひしひしと伝わってくるような気がしました。

この石を拝見しますと、当時の念仏者がいかに苦痛に耐えて御念仏を護っていかれたことかがありありと目に浮かんできます。私たちが今お念仏の教えが聴けるのは、この時代の念仏者のお陰でだと胸深く思わされました。私たちとは遠く離れた昔の人たちとのことだと、ご縁がないと思いがちかも知れません。しかし、この方々の言語を絶する忍耐によって浄土真宗が今まで時代の流れの中で消えなかったのです。我々も、次の世代のために、なぜ自分は浄土真宗の信者であるのか、そしてこの教えがなぜ今私にとって必要なのかと言うことを改めて真剣に考えなければならないと思わされました。そうでなければ、浄土真宗を伝えていく必要がなくなるのではないでしょうか。この涙石を思い出しながら、私自身にその問いを聞かせていただいたことでした。合掌


SACBC's Tenugui!
