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

I am a link in the Buddha's golden chain of love that stretches around the world. I must keep my link bright and strong. I will try to be kind and gentle to every living thing and protect all who are weaker than myself. I will try to think pure and beautiful thoughts, to say pure and beautiful words, and to do pure and beautiful deeds, knowing that on what I do now depends not only my happiness or unhappiness, but also that of others. May every link in the Buddha's golden chain of love become bright and strong, and may we all attain perfect peace.

This past month we observed Hanamatsuri on April 11th. The birth of the Buddha was an auspicious occasion and it is because of what Prince Siddartha does with his life, that sentient beings have the opportunity to encounter Amida Buddha's Great Compassion.

This year's observance was not able to take place in the hondo and in person with the sangha. However, we were greatly fortunate to have as our special guest Cherry Blossomz, who provided a most exquisite musical tribute to this wondrous occasion. This group which consists of three brilliant and talented ladies, sang three musical pieces: "In Lumbini's Garden," "Namo Amida Butsu" (an original piece), and "Arigato" which was performed in Japanese. The videos were pre-recorded, and the visual settings added to the peaceful ambience of their musical voices. It was a



great pleasure to have them as our musical guests and we look forward to their future endeavors and musical projects.

At the end of the service, I asked the group, who participated in our service, a number of different questions. One question I asked was how do you decide what songs to sing and what do you use as your inspiration? Lisa responded by saying, "We try to reflect and ask ourselves, 'What are some things that we really need to hear? What are some things that touch and connect to us?' We hope that if it helps heal us and remind ourselves of the teachings, then hopefully it will help all of you. Feeling our connection to that music is really important in conveying the message to everyone. It really helps that we personally connect to what we're singing."

I believe this is a really inspirational message because I believe this is also the appropriate approach to our spiritual paths. When we open our hearts and minds up to the message of Amida Buddha's Great Compassion, we awaken to the truth that we are embraced as we are in the world of warmth and light. When we encounter this joy, we naturally spread the message of the Nembutsu teaching to those around us. It is much like basking in the warmth and light of the sun. When we feel the warm embrace, we make it look so comfortable to others around us. In turn, they would want to join us in basking under the sun as well. But we first have to embrace this truth ourselves. The Buddha teaches us not to blindly believe; we should not just follow a teaching because people tell us to follow it. We must verify it with our own life experiences. Then, when we encounter this joy, we will naturally spread this message to others. We thank the Cherry Blossomz for a wonderful service together and their efforts to spread the teaching of Amida Buddha's Great Compassion. Namo Amida Butsu.

彼女たちはお参りに来てましたので、お勤めの終わりのほうに少し対談をしました 。その時、いくつか質問をしましたが、その中の一つはどのように歌う曲を選ぶの ですかと尋ねました。メンバーの一人であるリサさんはこのように答えました。「 自分たちが何が聞きたいのか、どのようなメッセージが私たちにとって必要なのか とまず考えますね。つまり、今悩んでいることに関して私たちにとって心にしっく りくるメッセージはなんなのか。そしてそのメッセージを他の人たちに役に立てば いいねと思い、それを歌います」と答えました。

私はこの答えが印象的でありました。つまり、このアプローチは我々が仏道を歩む 「求道者」としての姿勢でもあると感じたからです。阿弥陀如来様の大慈悲の世界 に心を開くと、その明るい暖かい世界にありのままで包まれていることが分かるの です。そしてこの優びに出あうと、その真実の教えを自然と周りの人たちに伝えて いきたいと思います。ちょうど日光浴みたいなものではないでしょうか。太陽のも とで気持ちよくリラックスしていると、周りの人たちもそれを見て、自分もやりた いなと思い始めます。しかし、自分がまずその気持ちよさが分からないといけない わけです。つまり、仏様の教えはただ単に智信的に信じることが戒められているの です。その教えの真実さを自分の人生を通して確かめなければなりません。そして 、その慶びと出あうと、その真実の教えを習ずから周りの人たちに伝えていきたい と思うのです。

今年のお花まつりのお勤めを「Cherry Blossomz」とご一緒にできて本当に貴重なご 縁をいただきました。彼女たちが阿弥陀如来様の大慈悲の教えを広めていこうとす る尽力をありがたく感謝しております。合掌。

With Rev Miyaji's guidance, we can find relevance in the teachings of the Buddha and find individual strength to meet these challenging times.

Rev. Dr. Takashi Miyaji's Message:

In viewing the recent increased attacks on Asian American individuals in various parts of the country as well as across the world, we are saddened by these senseless acts. Asian Americans have been the target of discrimination, ridicule, amusement, and now violence at the hands of many individuals of other ethnic backgrounds, yet are somehow expected to stay silent on their mistreatment.

As American Buddhists, this community is no stranger to ostracization and marginalization as was experienced by the incarceration of Japanese Americans in our recent history. Yet, our resilience and strength come not from anger and resentment, but rather, through the solidarity and self-reflection that humbles us to see the plight of the human condition.

As Buddhists, we center our lives on the Buddha Dharma, the world of Amida Buddha's infinite wisdom and compassion. Through this understanding, we are the first to admit our limitations as sentient beings who are ignorant of our ignorance, which makes us susceptible to blaming and hurting others for our misfortunes.

However, let us not respond with fueling the flames of anger with more anger, which is inextricably linked to ignorance. The Buddha teaches us that only love conquers hatred and enmity. What we as Jodo Shinshu Buddhists recognize is that this "love" that is being discussed here is first and foremost the Great Compassion of Amida Buddha. As such, it is on this fertile ground in which we take the first steps to extend our hearts out to others. It is on this unifying ground in which we identify the solidarity with other disenfranchised groups. It is on this sacred unity with all other beings that we remind ourselves that we are the links in Amida Buddha's Golden Chain. Finding solace in the ground of Great Compassion allows us to see more clearly the true state of the world we live in.
