Hello! My name is Landon Yamaoka and I would like to give you some information about myself. I attended the Palo Alto Buddhist Temple, and I have ties to the San Jose Betsuin. I don't remember hearing much about Jodo Shinshu growing up. I did pay attention to the stories Abiko Sensei taught about Siddhartha Gautama, learning from these stories' life lessons in "morality" or so I thought. Today I would use the term "ethics" how I understand Jodo Shinshu as guiding my life.

I grew up having some Asian friends through the temple, but not as many outside Temple. I was more-or-less Asian culturally but not totally. I mentioned last month that I re discovered Jodo

Shinshu Buddhism in a comparative religion class on Japanese religions. I called my mom to confirm we WERE really Jodo Shinshu! Most of the class knew about of Zen and Shinto, but no one had heard of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism.

I asked Abiko Sensei why I knew nothing in the class. He urged me to a great book, stating "It would speak to me". It was "The Evil Person; Essays on Shin Buddhism", by Shuichi Maida, translation done by Nobuo Haneda. This book blew my mind! I did not know, that Amida Buddha's compassion is targeted towards the Evil Person first and foremost. I didn't totally buy into this idea and I still struggle with it in regards to "logical" thinking. This did not fit my own understanding of how the world works. It has been explained in various ways over the years by different ministers, and while I trusted Abiko Sensei and the other minister's explanations it was still hard buy into it. But, Abiko Sensei was right! I was interested in this Jodo Shinshu doctrine.

What helped me somewhat start to understand this idea was an Anime called Dragonball Z. My Japanese history class professor one day called me out for wearing a bright yellow Dragonball Z shirt. He informed us THIS anime was loosely based on a Chinese Story, <u>Journey to the West</u>, in which the Monkey King (the character Goku in the Anime) went to look for Amida Buddha. The Monkey King (or Goku) had to battle various enemies, but sometimes after defeating some of them, he gave them the chance to work with him. I believe Goku does this as he too was bad early on but was given a second chance, so he passes this compassion onto others when possible.

Studying cultural anthropology this idea continued to pop up while trying to understand Jodo Shinshu. While Dragonball Z is not is not specifically Jodo Shinshu, here was part of the Japanese culture I had not really understood but observed ideas in this growing up. This idea of viewing the self WHILE in relationship to those around you was something I had learned subconsciously. Goku's actions are based in Buddhist ideology, we cannot separate Buddhism from Japanese culture. This is not to say one must be Japanese to understand Jodo Shinshu. However, we can slowly start to bridge the gap between at least black and white ideas and learn to search for a middle area. Not just things as good or just bad, but to see things in some grey area. I feel then we can continue on our own Journey to the West, looking out to Amida Buddha. We are all moving on our own path of spirituality, learning to appreciate our Shin teachings in new and different ways. I think when I can start to tie what I think I know to real life situations, I feel that I better understand Amida's Great Compassion. This is how one really deepens their own understanding of what spirituality means in our own Jodo Shinshu religion.


This Memorial Service is dedicated to all bishops of the Buddhist Churches of America and Resident Ministers of SACBC who have been born in the Pure Land.





"CARVING THE DIVINE" showing on Saturday, September 28, 2014 @ 3 PM

"Carving the Divine" is a documentary film by Director Yujiro Seki. The film presents a rare look into the 1400-year-old craft of sculpting from wood Japanese Buddhist statues and images. It follows the lives of both the master teachers and their apprentices who struggle to preserve the art, skills, and tradition of the *Busshi*.

Following the film, there will be a wonderful opportunity to ask questions of and exchange thoughts with Director Yujiro Seki.



REFLECTIONS upon seeing this documentary:

Carving the Divine is a movie that highlights the life of individuals who dedicate themselves to carving wooden sculptures of Buddhas and bodhisattvas. These images are very dear and important to a Buddhist practitioner's religious life. When we see just how much detail and labor goes into depicting the divine, we can get a sense of just how difficult it is for the world of truth to manifest itself to the beings of this world. And yet, here we have the world of truth depicted in form to connect and embrace us. When we see these images as they are presented to us, we cannot help but feel deep gratitude and humility in the presence of something so sacred and divine.
