I am a link in the Buddha's golden chain of love that stretches around the world. I must keep my link bright and strong. I will try to be kind and gentle to every living thing and protect all who are weaker than myself. I will try to think pure and beautiful thoughts, to say pure and beautiful words, and to do pure and beautiful deeds, knowing that on what I do now depends not only my happiness or unhappiness, but also that of others. May every link in the Buddha's golden chain of love become bright and strong, and may we all attain perfect peace.



Last weekend, we attended the Arizona Buddhist Temple's Obon Odori and Hatusbon Service. Having spent five years of my life in Arizona for undergrad, I was excited to go back. It was nice to revisit the Grand Canyon state, since this is where I returned to Jodo Shinshu after taking a class on Japanese religions. It was hot, but I spent a lot of time indoors on our mini-vacation before the Temple activities began.

I was worried about the political climate there since we tend to wear our masks for my health, but I am also more likely to spread COVID. We have had experiences outside of the Bay Area where people gave us dirty looks, if not actually being rude to us, just for wearing masks. Based on previous experiences, there was a concern about how things would go in Arizona, but I only noticed one person glaring at us with our masks on. (People were looking at us oddly, with some disapproval, but only in anger once). It was obvious there were many American flag shirts and apparel on people's cars and clothing. Even in a local artist boutique, we found many items that were more right-leaning. However, when we asked for help, our interactions were different than what we experienced elsewhere. Surprisingly, we were treated pretty well overall in the mall and at restaurants during our mini-vacation.

People don't like to be judged, but at the same time, we all judge people based on their appearances and perceived associations. Being in Arizona for half a decade, I know it is conservative, at least in Tucson. I assumed I would get poor treatment as an Asian man in a mask. We tend to base our worldview on previous experiences, and this is how we keep ourselves safe. Yet there will be times when we judge people because

of this, even if they would not be guilty of doing something we think they will do based on past interactions.

Perhaps we need to (when safe) attempt to go outside our comfort zone and openly admit when we have made untrue assumptions about others or incorrectly judged someone. It is easy to make broad sweeping statements about things only being good or bad, but, in Shin Buddhism, we must address our own judgements since there will be times when we unfairly assume untrue things about others. The more we live within our teachings, the more I think we need to address our own imperfections, as this allows us to see why we cannot act as perfect human beings. It is unethical to judge others, and then we complain when we have been judged, as Buddhism does ask us to address our true nature. Specifically in Shin Buddhism, we know we can never fully perfect this practice as our egos (and past traumas) prevents us from being fully transparent in our judgements and actions. However, the more we begin to see our true selves, the hope is, there will be times when we hold off on judging someone too quickly. I believe it is then that we are able to better embody our religious principles.

4. Fireworks are not allowed east of Mission Blvd, in City parks, on school property, or on City streets.
